

There is a long road ahead. I will be a novice for two years, study philosophy for two years, and serve for years before entering theology studies. It will be twelve or more years before I am ordained a priest, but I am in no rush. I have no idea where all I will live, or who all I will meet, but I trust God to take care of me.

My advice for people in discernment is this. Know yourself, your deepest desires, and what brings you joy. Fear is normal. Seek help from many people. Remember that we can only reach our fullest potential by making serious, life-long, loving commitments.

If I'm being honest with myself I had really pushed the question out of my mind. Priesthood was an idea that really scared me. The way that I used to think about discernment was that I brought to God the thing that I wanted to do to see if he approved it. So, when God seemed to be approving my desire for marriage I thought I was on the right track. Last summer I went on a program called FOCUS Summer Projects in Colorado where we spent our time growing deeper in our faith. Because of my experience there, I realized some of my mistakes in discernment. I knew that I needed to start discerning through action, so I went on a discernment retreat in Saint Louis at Kenrick Glennon Seminary. That weekend God showed me that he desired me to be there next year. When I shifted my discernment process away from asking God to approve what I wanted and instead asking God to show me what he desires for me I was able to find peace in this decision. I never would have come to this decision had it not been for the people that I met at CCM and the opportunities that I had there to encounter the sacraments and grow deeper in my faith.


